CRIBBERY AND GODLY TIME

Cribbery

Sundays, 8:45 a.m. – 12:15 p.m.

Nursery care is provided for babies and toddlers each Sunday. A paid cribbery supervisor and weekly volunteers provide loving care for the children in a safe environment. A special area is available for nursing mothers as well.

Godly Time

Sundays, 9:00 – 9:55 a.m.

Families begin worship together in the sanctuary. After *Time with Our Children*, children up through 5th grade may leave for their class or remain in worship.

Godly Care: Ages 2, 3 and 4

Under Six Classrooms

Children begin to develop their spiritual lives, and we teach them that they are precious children of God. They experience simple worship rituals and learn key stories in the Bible. Each story is told in a lively fashion using bright, colorful felt figures. Children respond through crafts, songs and prayers.

Godly Play: Kindergarten – Grade 2

Ruth Christie Room

Children learn the language of God's people through sacred space, sacred stories, parables and liturgical actions. Much more than play, this experience is highly structured and intentional.

Godly Kids

- **Hebrew Scouts: Grades 2 and 3**

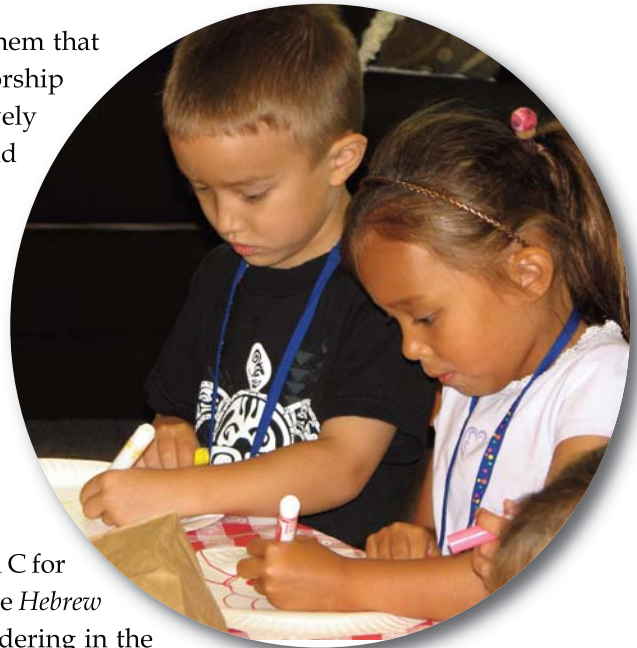
Meets in Classroom 2 and concludes in Under Six Classroom C for pickup after worship. Through imagination, children become *Hebrew Scouts*, experiencing the stories of the Israelite people wandering in the wilderness over a 40-year period.

- **Treasure Seekers: Grades 4 and 5**

Meets in Grace Hall and concludes in Under Six Classroom C for pickup after worship. *Treasure Seekers* begin with the story of Jesus' baptism and continue with stories of Jesus' ministry – teaching and healing – that happened on or near the water.

Keeping Our Children Safe: New Security Labels

This year, our cribbery, Godly Care, Godly Play, and Under Six Sunday School have begun using new security labels as part of their check-in and check-out process. Labels are available in the cribbery, Under Six, and the sanctuary pew pockets. A parent or guardian will fill out one side of the peel-and-stick label during the announcements, stick it to their child's back before the Time with Our Children, and retain the stub to be presented when they pick up their child. Did you know that there may soon come a day when there are no Christians living in the Holy Land? Today, Christians comprise only two percent of the population of Israel/Palestine. Do you know what our brothers and sisters in Christ living in the Holy Land say about what is happening there? The 2010 General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) encouraged Presbyterians to study *Kairos Palestine: A Moment of Truth*, an ecumenical confession of faith written by Palestinian Christians in 2009. This document's importance stems from the sincere expression of Palestinian Christian concerns for their people and their view of the moment of history they are living through. The General Assembly endorsed the document's "emphasis on hope for liberation, nonviolence, love of enemy and reconciliation."

Our class will include speakers and small group discussions of *Kairos Palestine*. Class members will be able to purchase their own copy of *Kairos Palestine* for \$2.00.

The “Surviving...” series of videos provides a unique approach to emotional self-help. Each program features popular lecturer, author and psychotherapist Clayton Barbeau doing what he considers his best work – individual counseling with you, the viewer, as the one seeking advice and affirmation. We will view and discuss the following videos:

- *Surviving Anger*. We face anger both from ourselves and others. The different causes of anger and the various guises that anger often takes are

discussed.

- *Surviving Broken Relationships*. Feelings of anger and pain that follow a broken relationship are natural. Barbeau helps you to understand and work with them.

- *Surviving Life Transitions*. Barbeau talks about the many experiences of change that make up daily living. Your ways of thinking, feeling and being are constantly changing. Change can be threatening caused by the fear of the unknown. He guides the viewer through the process of change and offers stories and strategies for healthy personal growth.

- *Surviving Loneliness*. Barbeau examines loneliness as part of everyone's life, especially in today's competitive society. Barbeau relates the stories of three different "lonely" people and the steps they took to help themselves. Pointing out that loneliness often results from our looking to someone else to make us whole, he offers many concrete strategies to counteract loneliness.

Of course, these programs are not intended as substitutes for face-to-face therapy when it is needed. Rather, they are meant to offer ideas for coping to the person who is temporarily experiencing emotional distress.

The contemporary understanding of the Christmas story is full of details that have developed gradually through the long history of Christmas celebrations. We think that there were three wise men, but no, the text speaks only of three kinds of gifts. We think that Jesus was born at night but no, the text tells only that the angels sang at night. This series of four video lessons tries to strip away the mythology that has grown up around Christmas and to set the Christmas story afresh in the light of Middle

Eastern culture. Topics included: Why didn't Joseph have Mary stoned? Was Jesus really born in a stable? Was Joseph really so inept that he couldn't find a place to stay in his own family's village? What special message does Jesus' birth have for women? Where did the wise men come from and why was myrrh one of their gifts to baby Jesus?

Beyond Theology

An evening DVD and discussion group led by Susan Moseley

Beyond Theology: A thought-provoking series of programs about the evolution of consciousness in a critical period of global convergence and environmental challenges. This is a ten-part series. We will explore the first five episodes this fall and the last five episodes in the spring.

This PBS series of half-hour programs explores the notion that the guiding mythologies of modern civilization are undergoing a metamorphosis of historic significance. Throughout this series, noted theologians and scholars reflect upon the specific challenges of our time, addressing the roots of contemporary culture

wars and global environmental crises. The series concentrates upon the emergence of viable worldviews that integrate scientific inquiry and spiritual insights while exploring the convergence of diverse religious traditions. Participants include Stephen Prothero, Professor of Religion, Boston University; Rabbi David Rosen, President of World Conference of Religion for Peace; Rev. Peter Gomes, Sr. Pastor, Memorial Church, Harvard University; Sister Joan Chittister, author/speaker, Benedictine Sisters of Erie, Pa; Karen Armstrong, author and public speaker, London.

Episode 1 – “A Finger Pointing at the Moon”
Facing unprecedented challenges on a global level, many people think we’re passing through a major transitional phase in human history. They contend that the basic images guiding our lives must change in order for us to successfully deal with these challenges.

Episode 2 – “Church and State”
The separation of church and state has been considered to be one of the most fundamental principles of our democracy. While some contend that we need to return to our roots as a Christian nation, others dispute the notion that the founding fathers intended this to be a nation dedicated to any particular religious tradition.

Episode 3 – “The Ground of Being”
When talking about God, a common image that arises is that of a father figure looking down on the Earth from above, this image is uncomfortable for some and does not include any of the feminine aspects of God as discussed by Jesus. This video suggests thinking about different ways to envision God; such as “The Ground of Being,” a phrase that’s been traced to the Ger-

man theologian Paul Tillich.

Episode 4 – “American Pluralism”

Religious and cultural diversity in the United States has increased significantly in the past few decades. The Pluralism Project at Harvard University maps the changing religious landscape, while organizations such as Inter-Faith Ministries of Wichita demonstrate how people of diverse traditions can come together to serve their communities.

Episode 5 – “Science and Spirituality”

While science and technology have been based primarily upon a materialistic approach to the world, most spiritual traditions have employed a more intuitive approach. As scientific exploration continues to unveil new views of the universe, what’s happening to our sense of the cosmos?
